Welcome to Route 66 on the Air Special Event 2026

We encourage local hams to activate a Special Event Station under the Call Sign W6L

W6L is a special event call sign for all of North East Oklahoma. The call is registered and administered by the Tulsa Amateur Radio Club but it is available to all Amateur Clubs and Hams in the area who wish to activate a Special Event Station for this, Route 66's 100 year Celebration.

Purpose of Route 66 On the Air

The purpose of the event is to commemorate the history of the "Mother Road" connecting the east and west United States. Through stories, songs and TV shows, the highway came to symbolize the spirit of the freedom of the open road, inspiring many to see America.

Route 66, established on November 11th 1926, as part of the U.S. Highway System, stretched 2,448 miles, from Chicago, Illinois to Santa Monica, California, passing through eight states: Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. Known as the "Main Street of America" and later dubbed the "Mother Road" by John Steinbeck in his 1939 novel, *The Grapes of Wrath*, it became an iconic symbol of American mobility and opportunity.

However, the demise of Route 66 began in the 1950's as the U.S. began its interstate highway system, and the highway was officially decommissioned in 1986. Today, small portions of the U.S. Highway 66 still exist in towns and rural areas in several states.

Although much of the original Highway 66 has been rerouted into a fast-moving interstate bypassing many of the small towns and interests of this nation, we take the week of 12 September 2026 to remember and celebrate and share the enthusiasm and memories that Highway 66 represented in its time... and even still today.

25 Special Event Stations under the 1x1 call sign have been set up to commemorate this event. W6L is the call sign set up for all of Northeast Oklahoma. Hams all over our area will be On the Air that week, remembering and making contacts and having conversations celebrating the freedom and opportunities that Route 66 represents. Help us celebrate the Freedom of the Open Road.

Background of Route 66 On the Air Special Event

Originally started by the Northern Arizona DX Association, it was a way to allow amateur radio operators a fun way to “Relive the Ride.” They also can relive their own memories of Route 66, and get to celebrate the highway’s rich history in making the U.S. what it is today.

Citrus Belt Amateur Radio Club (CBARC) in San Bernardino, CA took over the event a couple years after its inception and has grown into one of the best special amateur radio events of the year.

How to participate in Route 66 OTA as a Station Activator

---If you are a TARC member go to the web site below and indicate your intention to activate a station under the W6L umbrella of the Route 66 On the Air Special Event.

---If you are not a TARC (W5IAS) member the procedure is exactly the same.... As the procedure above... This is an event for all the Hams in Northeastern Oklahoma.

Select the Sign Up option.

--- left click the Route 66 tab that opens up the sign in and schedule selection.

---If you haven't signed in before, at the top of the page you will see a selection that says **"Sign in First"....** Click that and it will bring up the sign in dialog box that asks for name, call sign, license level etc also included in that is your email so we can communicate with all the activators and send you information and updates etc

---Again if you are not a TARC member the procedures are all the same--- see the instructions above.

How to select a Time Slot in the Schedule

After signing up, go down a few lines to the **"Scheduling Section"** by clicking the left most tab labeled **"Schedule Grid"**. A scheduling grid will appear and you can start selecting your operating slots. Below is an example of a portion of that grid.

You will notice that each band has many modes and slots to fill... pick several to your liking by simply clicking the box of your choice. That's all there is to it, just click the box. Your call sign will appear.

The license filter is an optional planning aid. Operators remain responsible for using frequencies and modes permitted by their FCC license.

There will be opportunities for two or more stations to operate on any of the time/band/mode slots, however.... We don't need 10 people crowding on the same time and mode.... So notice how the slots are filling up and try to pick a spot that needs a station...

There may be a time when you find yourself with a few hours to spare and you would like to operate for a couple of hours but you hadn't committed to that particular time slot... It's ok to jump in and work a few hours... It all works "As long as you have previously signed up as a special events operator" with the web site... See sign in procedures above

The sign in procedure fulfills the FCC requirement that the Registered Special Event Call Sign (W6L) Station is aware of each of the Specific Station Operators who are operating under the umbrella of that call sign In our case W6L... Once you have signed in, the program creates the list of operating stations.... And you are good to select a time slot and get on the air.

How to “un-select” a Time Slot in the Schedule

Oops make a wrong selection? or just wanting to change one... that can be done...

Just left click on the reservation that you want to remove and “un-register”. it’s that simple.

The Purpose of the Sign Up and Schedule

The purpose of the sign up and schedule for this event is not to be ultra strict and go overboard controlling everyone. But it does provide several advantages...

1---it is a means that will hopefully allow for better distribution of active W6L stations across the different times, bands and modes and hopefully keep folks from bunching up into just a few time slots but also be a means of stimulating more active operating stations.

2--- it allows for better communication with the activators involved throughout the week as the sign-in provides a list of names and emails.

3---it allows for better collection of contact data and post event follow up, knowing names and emails and will also help build and grow the list of activators for following years.

4---The sign up and schedule is a new program developed “in house” by our own W5JHC and it will have many uses for other TARC Amateur Events e.g. Field Day... so there may be a few hiccups along the way... We are asking not only for patience but also for feedback to make this program more and more useful in the Rt66ota event.

Typical QSO Examples and some guidelines

---Of course you must operate within your own Amateur License Band Privileges even though you will be using the call sign W6L. Each of the different modes have different ways of indicating the Rt66 OTA Special Station Status in the CQ/QSO. Below are a few examples..

---QSO EXCHANGE for this event the QSO exchange will be a **signal report (RST, dB)**

and State/Province or Country if foreign... We will try to track the states and countries contacted... it makes an interesting map.

---CW CQ Example

CQ CQ R66 OTA de W6L ...or variations there of...

Then exchange RST and State/Province or Country

---note every 10 minutes you must identify your station call sign as the operator of the W6L Special Events Station. That might sound something like: R66OTA W6L by “your call sign” and location.

---**FT8** --- For FT8 go to settings and change your call to W6L and then in the computer to computer exchange you might add “Rt66ota” or something like that to identify the Special Event.

---SSB CQ Example

CQ CQ Route 66 On the Air this is W6L ...or variations there of...

Then exchange Signal Reports and your State or Location

-----again every 10 minute you must transmit... This is “your call sign” operating the Route 66 Special Event Station W6Lnear Route 66 in Eastern Oklahoma, celebrating the Freedom of the Open Road... it’s good to describe your location, give a county, or a grid square etc... Put together a little Rt66 Speil about the event and where you are located Make it fun...

Again you must identify your personal station call sign as an operator of W6L. The FCC will like you for that.

On Site Operation---

When it’s hot in August, no one thinks much about setting up a remote station, outside, at an interesting site that’s associated with Route 66... But in September that may be more of an acceptable opportunity... Please feel free to set up a site and operate W6L right there on the Mother Road. Have fun with that... also there are times that the Club Trailer may be free and several can make a bigger splash and draw a little attention to the Event and to our respective clubs... Go for it.

Frequencies

Above are the recommended frequencies for RT66 On the Air Activating Stations... noticing that they all end in 66 if they can... a little bit of 66 quaint glamor there...! Now that should be a starting point for all of us. As the 66 hunters will start looking there... but realistically in past years, we all know that sometimes one finds a clear space in the band and camps there... so you can expect to see many Rt 66 stations everywhere... especially if the bands are good... The main criteria for us is **Be Flexible and Be Courteous...**

Interference

There is a good chance that frequency spacing may be problematic... use adequate spacing to keep from interfering with other nearby stations. 3kHz or more for phone and 200-500 Hz or more for CW. Be Patient and Be Kind.

New Hams

This is a chance for new Hams to get involved in a low key, low stress Activation/Contest situation and develop experience in handling such a situation... Two ways to go about it... notice in the QSO modes above there are some typical QSO “speak” that you can learn... also just listen in on someone who is handling the moment and learn vicariously.

There is also a chance to play CoPilot to someone who is good at it.... and experience the action from the “right” seat so to speak... If you would like to be there and “learn” with someone... we can make that happen... please contact Daryl Reimer N5NYT (see QRZ for my email) and we can set up that learning moment... so that in the future you will be able to go at it alone. That’s the main goal... to get new people out there and on the air.

Also it’s a good way to learn the ropes of a “new to you” logging program.

Future New Hams

This is also the chance to inject some Ham DNA into some young man or woman who shows an interest... Invite them to your shack... involve them with logging and have them make a few calls there in your presence... get them on the air... make it fun

Oklahoma Special Event Call Signs

The Oklahoma Special Event Stations are **Elk City, W6J** and **Oklahoma City W6K** and **Tulsa W6L...** there is also an **Aeronautical Rover** that will be flying back and forth above Rt 66 which is also out of Oklahoma City...that call is **W6Y**.
